NASS IX (Tartu, August 17-20th 2015): Semiotic (un-)predictability



This is a preliminary announcement – the first call for papers will be made in September 2014. More details will be made public then.

NASS IX, which is convened by Tiit Remm (tiit.remm@ut.ee) on behalf of University of Tartu's Department of Semiotics, will be a NASS conference and simultaneously an event in the Tartu Semiotics Summer School series (see the webpage for the 2013 summer school), with a common program. The Tartu Semiotics Summer School is a high-level academic event aiming to provide learning trough expression and discussion for each and every participant, whether scholar or student. The conference will include presentations, plenary lectures, roundtables, a day out of town and evening discussions.

We will invite papers and roundtable proposals inquiring processes and structures that enable semiotic predictability and unpredictability, particular mechanisms of these as well as the role, value and nature of (scientific) predictability in the research field of semiotics. Proposals can focus on theoretical issues, case studies and also the practical value of semiotic (un-)predictability.

The topic of semiotic predictability and unpredictability is a central concern in Juri Lotman's works about cultural memory and culture as a dynamic system. In relation to system approaches, the topic brings together cultural, social and biological systems, and poses the question of the existence of particularly semiotic mechanisms mediating order and change in these. While works on semiotic systems often focus on structural organisation, this is a heuristic choice and not a denial of dynamics, the regular or irregular changes or disruptions. Predictability is also of utmost practical value in cognition – from simpler forms of life via human everyday life to tasks of scientific inquiry and practically oriented applications of semiotics.

NASS launches graduate student support

At the General Assembly of NASS in Aarhus in 2013, several ideas related to making use of funds from the NASS membership fee for developing and organising new NASS activities were brought up (see the minutes from the General Assembly in NASS newsletter #4). The NASS board has recently decided that in relation to NASS IX, funds will be allocated to two measures:

- **Graduate student grants:** The participation of up to 10 graduate students will be supported financially by NASS, with 150 Euro each.
- **Graduate student prize:** A prize will be awarded for the best graduate student presentation at the conference.

Details are to be worked out by the Governing Board. More info will appear in the next newsletter of NASS, #6 (Autumn 2014).


Brand Equity Planning with Structuralist Rhetorical Semiotics

Brand Equity Planning with Structuralist Rhetorical Semiotics furnishes an innovative conceptual model and methodology for brand equity planning, with view to addressing a crucial gap in the existing marketing and semiotic literatures concerning how advertising multimodal textual elements may be transformed into brand associations, with an emphasis on rhetorical relata as modes of connectivity between a brand's surface and depth grammar. The scope of this project is inter-disciplinary, spanning research areas such as brand equity, structuralist semiotics, textual semiotics, visual and film semiotics, multimodal rhetoric, film theory, psychoanalysis. The proposed connectionist model of the brand trajectory of signification is operationalized through a methodological framework that encompasses a structuralist semiotic interpretative approach to the textual formation of brand equity, supported by quantitative content analysis with the aid of the software Atlas.ti and the application of multivariate mapping techniques. Meaning Making: It's what we do; it's who we are by Floyd Merrell

Meaning Making sheds light on the following assumptions, largely following C. S. Peirce: (1) pre-linguistic sign modes of feeling, sensing and experiencing entail consciousness-becoming; (2) consciousness-becoming, culminating in linguistic signs, is always in the process of becoming something other than what it was becoming, and (3) linguistic signs are never complete and consistent, for they continuously draw from pre-linguistic semiotic processes. These processes involve signs incessantly becoming other signs in interdependent, interactive interrelatedness. The three terms carry the implication that all signs are complementarily coalescent; they are always in the process of merging with one another. Illustration of the complementary coalescent processual flow of signs involves split-second decision-making — examples are chiefly from baseball and soccer — when one has no time consciously to think and then act on one's thinking. Decisions must be made in the blink of an eye, and they must be spontaneously acted on. This rapid-fire semiotic transition from pre-linguistic feeling-becoming to interpreting-becoming emphasizes ongoing process, rather than relatively fixed product. Process is the principle key qualifying Peirce's concept of semiosis.

Regional Conference of the International Association for Visual Semiotics, 9–11 September 2014, Urbino, Italy, Collegio del Colle "Re-mediation: Figurative and plastic levels under technological assumptions".







The aim of the Conference is to deepen the theoretical and methodological aspects of the re-mediation, in terms of experience, translation and reconception of traditional media. The x-ray that restores the painting, video animating a map, 3D glasses that exploits actions at a distance, like visiting a museum or getting across planar surfaces. This "technological body", scrutinizing the visible and the invisible, still narcotizes taste and smell, but enhances haptical perceptions and hearing. It interposes its enonciative praxis with the discoursive dynamics of the media that subsumes. Semiotics, through an explicit focus on mediatization, can redefine the analysis of plastic, figurative and figural levels of the image. And, thirty years after Greimas's article, "Sémiotique figurative e sémiotique plastique" (1984), it returns to discuss tools and categories of description, engaging in confrontation with other approaches to visual languages.

The strategic objective of this Congress is the expansion and reinforcement of the semiotic web. "Innovation" is not only a theme from the title but also informs the organization of the Congress. The Congress will be preceded by a broad discussion on social media so as to enable participants to select the most interesting topics and facilitators for scientific sessions and round tables. This will also provide an opportunity to highlight the profile of new semiotics – that which constantly occurs on separate sites but which today needs to be strengthened by common formulations and a common strategy, new tactics for the affirmation of this disciplinary field both in the new academic realities and outside the university, in the labour market and the market of research services. 

CFP: 10th International Symposium on Iconicity in Language and Literature, 26–28 March, 2015, University of Tübingen, Germany

The tenth in a series of biennial international and interdisciplinary symposia organized by the Iconicity Research Project since 1997, this meeting will once again focus on iconicity – understood as form miming meaning and form, and meaning miming form and meaning – in language and in literature.
