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Report from the 13th conference of the Nordic Association for Semiotic Studies (NASS)

Feeling - Skill - Knowledge

Helsinki, Finland, 7–9 June 2023 Edited by Merja Bauters, Siiri Tarrikas and Lauri Linask



The XIII conference of the Nordic Association for Semiotic Studies took place on 7–9 June 2023 and was hosted by Sibelius Academy of Uniarts Helsinki, Aalto University, University of Helsinki and the Semiotic Society of Finland.

The conference focused on the epistemologies and ontologies of signs and minds and how the processes of signification entail different aspects of feeling, skill and knowledge. Connecting to the systemic relationality of the subject and the world, these viewpoints on doing and being, discourse and development have been at the heart of semiotics through the diachrony in various contexts. Now, in the rapidly, even brutally changing world, understanding signs, signification and their dynamics seems more crucial than ever, as it may affect securing how the human and their practices, their social systems and societies, cultures and the environment may flourish in whatever way the future will unfold.

Invited keynote speakers were Prof. Kristiina Ilmonen from Sibelius Academy Uniarts Helsinki, with "The the topic of contemporary folk musician as a hybrid reconstruction - Using musical practice and emotional engagement to gain knowledge about

the past". Ilmonen's talk was on the first day and provided a journey of folk musicians towards contemporary times and current practices. She specializes in ethnic woodwind instruments such as archaic Nordic flutes and pipes and played most wonderful ethnic music. Her talk tied up well with various topics of the

conference. **Prof. emer. Tim Ingold from the University of**

Aberdeen reflected on "Meaning without Signs: Semiosis or Direct Perception?" questioning aspects of semiotic practices and suggesting opening new discussion on the very foundations of the study of meaning as the science has gone forward. **Prof. Dario Martinelli from Kaunas University of Technology** addressed the topical issue of "Cancel/call-out/accountability culture: threat or opportunity? And: can semiotics help?" providing ideas on how needed semiotics is in current society to address and analyse the events and activities arising through the value changes – a thought-provoking presentation, which raised well-needed discussion.

The local organising committee included **Juha Ojala** (University of the Arts Helsinki), Merja Bauters (Tallinn University) Lily Díaz-Kommonen (Aalto University), Aleksi Haukka (University of Helsinki) and conference assistant Gonçalo Cruz (University of the Arts Helsinki), who also designed all the visual materials for the conference. The scientific committee included Merja Bauters, Øyvind Eide, Paulius Jevsejevas, Sara Lenninger, Lauri Linask, Oscar Miyamoto, Alin Olteanu, Inesa Sahakyan, Aleksei Semenenko and Morten Tønnessen. We wish to thank all, but especially Juha, who had all strings in his hand throughout the conference planning, execution and aftermath. The conference

became larger than first expected, with 3 parallel sessions, 87 presentations and 105 participants registered. The abstract book can be found here. There 16 sessions, were including the track for the Anniversary Symposium of the Semiotic Society of Finland.

The outcome of the conference is, as has been tradition to **NASS**, a competitive collection of essays inspired by the conference. The proposal has been

submitted to Springer's Numanities book series. It will have 34 chapters and will be edited by Merja Bauters, Gonçalo Cruz, Lily Diaz-Kommonen and Juha Ojala (in alphabetic order).

Report from the NASS General Assembly

The latest NASS General Assembly (GA) was held on Friday June 9 2023 at the Helsinki Music Center, Finland within the framework of the 13th conference of NASS "Feeling – Skill – Knowledge" All the conference participants were entitled to attend this GA. The functioning of the association and the board was explained to the new members. Brief reports from the NASS president **Morten Tønnessen** and NASS treasurer **Paulius Jevsejevas** were presented.

NASS home area is constituted by the following countries: Denmark, Estonia, Finland, Iceland, Latvia, Lithuania, Norway, and Sweden. Each country is represented in the NASS board by two members (an Ordinary Representative and a Supplementary Representative), who are elected at the

Traces of Extinction: Species Loss, Solastalgia, and Semiotics of Recovery

The sixth mass species extinction is one of the greatest ecological threats of our time. This conference focuses on cultural, subjective and semiotic approaches to extinction. A subjective approach to extinction may raise the question of how we experience extinction in the shared lifeworld or semiosphere. At the same time, artistic research seems to open fresh perspectives in combining cultural creativity with environmental decline. Extinction also reduces biocultural diversity and the resilience of ecocultures. By taking a perspective through naturecultures and cultural-ecological systems, we treat extinction as the degradation of such combined systems.

This perspective raises questions about cultural strategies that are effective in adapting to extinction, supporting endangered species, and overcoming trauma:

- How is extinction perceived subjectively, both from the point of view of the dying species and the humans who witness it?
- What cultural strategies can be used to raise awareness of extinction?
- What means do individuals and communities have for reducing and avoiding species extinction?

August 15-17, 2024 / Lund, Sweden

The conference theme is "Crises of Meaning". Currently we face not only social, political, environmental, and scientific crises but also - and arguably underlying these - crises in how we make sense of ourselves and our world. Husserl diagnosed a general "Crisis of the European Sciences" nearly a century ago, leading us to oscillate between the extremes of positivism and relativism. We witness how this has only deepened, given increasing gulfs between science and the humanities, between technology and

spirituality, between "civilizations", and between conflicting "narratives", and even "truths". Our plenary speakers (and other speakers, as far as possible) are asked to address some aspect of this meaning crisis from the perspective of their own research. In this way, cognitive semiotics can hopefully make a contribution to the situation in our troubled world!


Oral presentations: These will last 20 minutes, followed by 10 minutes for questions and movements between rooms (**Deadline: January 15, 2024**)



Call For Papers

5th International Conference on Semiotics of Culture and Visual Communication

26-28 June 2024, Cyprus University of Technology, Lemesos, Cyprus



The 5th International Conference on Semiotics of Culture and Visual Communication is organized by the Cyprus Semiotics Circle together with the Semiotics and Visual Communication Research Lab and the Department of Multimedia and Graphic Arts of Cyprus University of Technology. The conference aims to investigate the broad subject fields of Semiotics of Culture and Visual Communication in a widest

context, celebrating the exploration of connections, tensions, contradictions and complementarity between the diversity of research outputs under the subject of 'Otherness- The Other'. The conference is organised under the auspices of International Association for Semiotic Studies (IASS-AIS) and the Hellenic Semiotics Society (HSS).

In the post-modern context of social, political and cultural discourse, the concept of *Otherness-The Other* has emerged as a critical and universal subject of research. While it encapsulates a fundamental recognition of individuals or groups, who are perceived as different or distinct from oneself or from the dominant societal norms and identities, the idea of Otherness concerns the practices of othering in the areas of race, gender, ethnicity, class, sexuality, religion, nationality and, more generally, everyday social action and interaction. The binary structure of the sign itself builds on difference, on the One and the Other, the Being and non-Being, the Real and the Fake, the Accepted and the Rejected etc. Consequently, when Kristeva introduces the concept of the "abject", she examines how the "rejected" disturbs boundaries of binarism and plays a significant role in shaping subjectivity. While marginalisation stems from a complex interplay of societal norms, power structures, and deeply ingrained prejudices that perpetuate the rejected of "the invalid", we consider the role of Semiotics is vital in exploring and interrogating the mechanisms involved in constructing Otherness and The Other.

We invite papers that approach the conference's theme through either macro and/or micro examples, during a quite socio-politically unstable era, where comprehending these phenomena and providing effective readings not only becomes increasingly important, but sometimes, vital for survival. The conference seeks to bring together scholars, researchers and practitioners who share a common interest in Semiotics, Culture and Visual Communication. The conference will take place with physical presence and accepts papers in the English and Greek languages. Accepted authors with presentation at the conference will be eligible to publish their work in the selected proceedings.

THEMES

We welcome proposals for individual papers (approximately 20 minutes long, plus 10 minutes for discussion), exploring the notion of *Otherness-The Other* through, but not limited to, one of the following themes:

- 1. Applied Arts (Graphic Design, Typography Design, Editorial Design, Fashion Design, Industrial Design, Interior Design, Architecture etc.)
- 2. Visual Arts (Painting, Sculpture, Photography etc.)
- 3. Identity (National, Political, Cultural, Gender, Sexual etc.)

- 5. Philosophy and the rhetoric of Otherness/The Other
- 6. Social Constructs and Stereotypes
- 7. Conspiracy Theories
- 8. Popular Culture and Mass Media (Newspaper, Advertising, Magazines, Television, Cinema)
- 9. Digital Culture, Interactive Media, Social Networks
- 10. Artificial Intelligence (AI)
- 11. Political Communication
- 12. Tourism, National/City Branding


Panel proposals should be submitted through the specified online form which can be accessed via the link. They should include:

- 1. Name/Affiliation/e-mail of convenor(s), Title, Abstract (200-300 words) and Keywords (up to 5).
- 2. One participant may submit, convene or co-convene only two panels.
- 3. All convenors are expected to register and to pay the Congress registration fee, in accordance with the provisions applying to all participants in the Congress scientific programme.
- 4. All convenors, along with all participants in the Congress, will need to pay the membership fee for the IASS-AIS at the point of registration.
- 5. All panel proposals should be in English to ensure maximum accessibility by potential participants, but can also be presented in any of the other official languages of the IASS-AIS.
- 6. Panel convenors are responsible for selecting the most appropriate papers in terms of both subject and rigour for their panels, from amongst those that are going to be submitted to them during the following STEP 2.
- 7. Panels should include at least 4 papers, including the convenor(s)'s paper(s).

Panel proposals will be reviewed by the Scientific Committee and Programme Committee. Panel convenors will receive the final decision on their panel evaluation via e-mail from the Organizing Committee by 15 January 2024. The decision may consist of 'accept', 'recommendations for minor changes', 'recommendations for merging with another similar panel' or outright 'rejection'.



From Mimetic Translation to Artistic Transduction: A Semiotic Perspective on Virginia Woolf, Hector Berlioz, and Bertolt Brecht.

Discusses how literary translation can be retranslated into new ways of thinking about music and other arts in transduction.

Roman Jakobson gave a literary translation of the double words and concepts of poetical hyper translation. Language can transmit verbal translation to explore new ways of thinking about music and other arts. Thomas A. Sebeok deconstructed the energy of translation into the duplicated genres of artistic transduction. In semiotics, transduction is a technical expression involving music, theater, and other arts. Jakobson used Saussure's theory to give a single meaning in a different art but with other words and sounds, later followed by Peirce's dynamic energy with a floating sensation of the double meaning of

words and concepts. For semiotician Peirce, literary translation becomes the graphical vision of ellipsis, parabole, and hyperbole. Ellipsis is illustrated by Virginia Woolf's novel The Waves to give a political transformation of Wagner's opera Das Rheingold. Parabole is illustrated by the two lines of thought of Hector Berlioz. He neglected his own translation of Virgil's Aeneid, when he retranslated the vocal text to accompany the musical lyrics of his opera The Trojans. Hyperbole is demonstrated by Bertold Brecht's auto-translation of Gay's The Beggar's Opera. In the cabaret theater of The Three penny Opera, Brecht recreated his epic hyper-translation by retranslating the language of the folk speech of the German working classes with the jargon of criminal slang.
