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

THE 14TH CONFERENCE OF THE NORDIC ASSOCIATION FOR SEMIOTIC STUDIES ALONG WITH THE 15TH ANNUAL LOTMAN DAYS

Tallinn, Estonia, June 11–13, 2025

Venue: Tallinn University School of Humanities & Juri Lotman Semiotics Repository

The intricate interplay of signs with the processes of creativity, complexity, and intelligence are immersed in all varieties, modalities, and ecologies of meaning-making. Meaning-making is always creative, complex, and intelligent, in both its agreements, alignments, and continuums, as well as its incompatibilities, controversies, and contradictions.

According to Juri Lotman, one of the defining characteristics of an intelligent semiotic system is its ability to be creative, i.e. the ability to produce new and unpredictable meanings. Lotman noted that this ability is not exclusive to the human mind but can occur in various other systems and at multiple scales, where a sufficient degree of complexity is present.

The role of creativity in learning and development, be it in humans or non-humans, is integrative within patterns of emergence, reproduction, and decay in complex systems, such as nature, culture, or the individual mind.

Intelligence – be it organic or artificial, individual or collective – manifests in various signs and sign systems and is in time creatively transformed through meaning-making. We kindly invite proposals for conference presentations and sessions of presentations on the dynamic relationships between

signs, creativity, complexity, and intelligence and their transformative impact within education, art or the arts, play, and scientific inquiry.

We welcome papers on the topics of interest, including but not limited to:

- Semiotic theories of creativity, complexity, and intelligence;
- The nature and culture of creativity, complexity, and intelligence;
- Creativity, complexity, and intelligence in various modalities of meaning-making;
- Creativity, complexity, and intelligence in humans and non-humans;
- The relationships between various cognitive processes and creativity, complexity, and intelligence;
- Agency, the self, and subjectivity within creativity, complexity, and intelligence;
- Creativity, complexity, and intelligence in organic and artificial systems;
- Emergence and decay of creativity, complexity, and intelligence;
- Creativity, complexity, and intelligence in art, play, and science;
- Creativity, complexity, and intelligence in education, learning and development;
- Language and other sign systems in relation to creativity, complexity, and intelligence;
- Digital technologies in relation to creativity, complexity, and intelligence;
- Ecologies of creativity, complexity, and intelligence;
- Futures and prospects of creativity, complexity, and intelligence. (Expectations and anticipations)

Plenary speakers and prospective deadlines will be announced in autumn 2024.

The **Lotman Days** are an annual conference series that has been held at Tallinn University since 2009. 

APPROACHES TO SOCIAL SEMIOTICS AND SOCIAL MEDIA

October 4, 2024

Venue: Paris Nanterre University, France

The 20th century marked many new approaches to linguistic enquiry, including an interest in the interplay between multiple resources to construe meaning, as well as a focus on the social dimension of language and the way language is informed by specific social, cultural and institutional contexts. The interplay between linguistic and non-linguistic resources, and particularly the visual medium, have been the subject of a number of semiotic and multimodal theories. These theories have served multiple types of objects of study (e.g., static/moving; two/three-dimensional; object/space), and include objects as varied as body language (e.g. Ferré 2019), dance (e.g. Maiorani 2020), the printed page, picturebooks (Painter 2017), slide presentations (e.g. Rowley-Jolivet 2004, Zhao, Djonov and van Leeuwen 2014), the spatial organisation of museums and commercial spaces (e.g. Ravelli and McMurtie 2016), video content, toys, video games (Hawreliak 2019) and language learning (Guichon and Tellier 2017). More recently, the attention placed on the digital medium has extended to social media, which play host to many new types of configurations of resources that condition new behaviours, challenge previous categories, and hence warrant specific examination.

This conference aims to bring together scholars who integrate semiotic and multimodal analysis into their linguistic analyses, and to take as a common object of study the example of social media content. The main purpose of the conference is to compare and contrast various theoretical approaches, and to engage a conversation in terms of epistemology. One axis of enquiry will be to explore the heritage of social semiotic theory as developed within the framework of systemic functional linguistics (e.g., Kress and van Leeuwen 1996, 2005; Van Leeuwen 2005; Zhao, Djonov, Björkvall and Boeriis 2017), exploring the potential of the applications of its "grammar of visual design", and comparing it with other approaches. The discussion will be further enriched by general digital discourse theory (e.g., Combe 2019; Jones 2020; Jones and Hafner 2021; Paveau 2017; Tagg 2015), and by studies relating to content produced in an English and/or French language context.

The organisers welcome proposals which explore for instance:

- the interplay between linguistic (text) and non-linguistic resources (e.g., image, photograph, video) engendered by social media content within a specific platform or across platforms (e.g. Instagram, TikTok, Facebook, YouTube, LinkedIn, WhatsApp, Twitter/X, etc.);
- the new configurations of meaning born out of new digital discourse practices;
- the influence of built-in technical options (captions, music, filters etc.) in social media video, and, more generally, the influence of technical constraints (e.g., algorithms);
- applications within the fields of literacy, visual literacy, media literacy (first and second-language learning);
- the impetus placed on the visual medium within contemporary (digital) communication culture.

CHOICES: Never-Ending Dilemmas in Everyday Life

This book is about the never-ending need we have to make choices. If you think about it, we have to decide what time to wake up every morning, what to wear (unless we need to wear a uniform), what to have for breakfast (if we eat breakfast), lunch and dinner (and if we eat in restaurants, what to order), and our need to make all kinds of other choices all day long.

Some of our choices are mundane, like what to have for breakfast (if we eat breakfast): to have coffee or tea (and if so, plain or with milk), cereal, toast or a bagel (and if so, what kind: plain, with poppy seeds, with everything) or

a sweet roll, eggs (if so, fried, soft boiled, scrambled), and so on. Most of the choices we make are not important, and we often develop habits to relieve us of having to think about our choices. For example, I have the same thing for breakfast every day: a bowl of oatmeal with chia seeds and flax seeds, hot milk, a cup of espresso coffee with hot milk, and half a bagel with butter. Occasionally, I have a soft-boiled egg, as well.

But other choices we have to make are life-changing, such as how to live (single, living with a partner, or getting married), what kind of education to get, what kind of job or profession to choose, where to live and what kind of house to buy (if you can afford a house), whom to vote for, and so on. After reading this book, you will better understand the role that the choices we make play in society and culture and in our everyday lives.




